

Why do we celebrate?

Big Bang:

The reception classes will be set up as a celebration area, covering many different types of celebrations including, Halloween, weddings, birthdays, Diwali etc. The staff will be dressed in a typical celebration costume and the children are welcome to come dressed in their chosen celebration costume.

Maths:

Reception will be focussing on composition of numbers 1, 2, 3. They will also be focussing on geometry and spatial thinking, where we will be investigating 2d shapes.

Creative Arts:

The children will have the opportunity to engage in role play activities based around the different celebrations that we will be exploring. Through child-initiated activities the children will be encouraged to create music for our celebrations.

Published Work:

The children will write invitations and greetings cards for the different celebrations.
