

SAFEGUARDING

Garden and Park Safety Message for Parents

As your children enjoy playing in the garden, it's crucial to teach them a few simple safety rules, especially when it comes to the berries they might encounter. The bright, tempting fruits can be dangerous, and knowing which ones to avoid is key to keeping them safe. Here are some common garden berries to watch out for:

These large, bright red berries may look sweet and harmless, but they contain toxins that can cause harmful reactions. Even more dangerous is the seed inside, which is highly poisonous. Yew berries are especially common in September, so be sure your children know not to touch or eat them.

Privet Hedge Berries

Dark purple and resembling blackcurrants, these berries are often mistaken for edible fruit. However, they can cause stomach pain if ingested. Privet berries appear in late winter and early spring, a time when kids might mistake them for other safe-to-eat berries.

lvy produces black, clustered berries from November through January. These berries are toxic and should never be eaten. Remind your children to avoid them while playing in the garden or when you're out enjoying the winter weather.

Mistletoe Berries
These small white berries can cause blurred vision, stomach pain, and even convulsions if eaten in large quantities. While mistletoe is common around the holidays, the entire plant is poisonous, so

These shiny black berries, about the size of cherries, are highly toxic. Though they may look appealing in the late summer sun, eating them can be extremely dangerous.

As the seasons change and berries continue to grow, remind your children: never eat berries they find in the garden or outside unless a trusted adult has confirmed they are safe. By teaching them this rule, you can help ensure they stay safe while exploring the outdoors.
