Big Bang:

The Nursery will be learning about people who help us, the difference between fictional superheroes and our everyday heroes!

The children are welcome to come dressed as their chosen <u>every-day hero</u>, i.e emergency services, armed forces, doctor, dentists, builders, teachers etc (Anybody that helps us.). If you don't have a hero costume the children will have a chance to dress up using school costumes!

Maths:

Bluebells will continue exploring colour, shape and size. We will make comparisons between objects relating to size, length, weight and capacity. We will be practising using positional language to describe location and routes.

Creative Arts:

The children will have the opportunity to engage in role play activities based on their own experiences. Through child-initiated activities children will be supported to create closed shapes with continuous lines. We will be creating our own songs to express feelings and emotions.

They will copy/write their name on their own work as every artist needs to add their signature to their work.


Fiction Activities

Non-fiction activities


We will be sharing some non-fiction text to support learning the difference between fiction and nonfiction.
